

Uniform

The colour of Doxey Primary school's uniform is red. We encourage all children to wear school uniform, which consists of:

- Red polo shirt plain or embroidered with our school \odot badge
- Grey skirt, pinafore, trousers or shorts \odot
- Red school jumper or cardigan plain or embroidered with our school badge
- Red and white checked summer dress (Summer term \odot only)
- Black school shoes no trainers, boots or high heels please
- PE Kit—Black hoodie embroidered with school logo, plain coloured t-shirt, plain black tracksuit trousers, shorts or leggings and trainers.

We also ask that your child has a warm coat, hat and gloves for outdoor play in the winter and a hat to protect them from the sun during the summer.

Please ensure that all items of clothing and footwear are clearly marked with your child's name - school jumpers all look the same on a hot day!

Due to the risk of loss and accidental injury, children should not wear ear-rings or any other jewellery in school, including play jewellery.




The Early Years Foundation Stage

The Early Years Foundation Stage covers seven areas of learning. They are:

- Personal, Social and Emotional Development
- Physical Development
- **Communication and Language**
- Mathematics
- Literacy
- Understanding of the World
- **Expressive Arts and Design**

When all of these areas are incorporated together in a stimulating learning environment it enables the children to develop the key skills and positive attitudes for successful learning throughout the school.



You have one important thing to give your child, **TIME**, so please allow your child to:

- Talk to you
- Tell you stories
- Ask questions
- Explain what you are doing
- Develop their language by offering them a variety of experiences. For example, have fun outings to places of interest, the park, the library or just exploring in the garden.

Starting School

Starting school should be a happy time for you and your child.

Children find starting school very tiring at first so please remember this if they come home slightly irritable and demanding.

The First Day

On the first day please allow plenty of time to get your child to school and into their classroom on time. You will be able to take your child into their new classroom and help your child settle.

At times during the first few weeks there will be tears, but be brave and leave your child as quickly as possible. A quick kiss and a goodbye will usually mean the children are playing happily with their new friends before you have left the school grounds. If you are worried please phone when you get home.





How to Help your Child

Parents often ask how to prepare their children before starting Reception.

The answer is you are probably doing all the necessary things without realising it.

Here are a few helpful suggestions.

Encourage your child to:

- Put on their coat or jumper by themselves
- Go to the toilet on their own.
- Sit at a table whilst eating and always encourage good table manners. To use a knife and fork when eating their dinner.
- Help you with simple tasks, tidying away their toys, cooking • or sorting the washing.

All these activities will help your child to be more independent and therefore settle quickly into their new class.







Here are a small selection of the activities the children will be encouraged to participate in Reception and ideas you can do at home with your child.



Develop their independence and confidence by: Playing with other children Taking turns and sharing Talking about their feelings and experiences. Participating in group activities

Develop their love of books and reading by:

- Reading and sharing a variety of books, magazines and words around us
- Singing songs together
- **Sharing Nursery Rhymes**
- Learning to handle books carefully



Develop their mathematical skills by:


- Counting objects in a row, group and from a larger group
- Finding out about the value of numbers
- Comparing numbers
- Addition and subtraction in practical situations
- Exploring shape, space and measure





Develop their mark making and writing skills by: Watching others write messages, cards, shopping lists, letters and stories Making marks and writing with a range of writing tools, e.g. chalk, pencils, and pens Mark making and writing freely with their preferred hand using a tripod grip





Develop their life experiences by:

- Investigating and talking about objects and living things
- Using battery operated and remote control toys
- Talking about events they take part in
- Talk about similarities and differences

Develop their creative ability by:

- Mark making, drawing and colouring
- Cutting and gluing
- Painting and making models





Develop their physical skills by: Using scissors and writing tools Being active: running, jumping, skipping, climbing and dancing Playing with play dough Catching, kicking and rolling balls

All these activities can be achieved through play.

Play is the most important part of learning throughout the Early Years Foundation Stage. Through constructive and supportive play children can become confident and creative learners.



Develop their love of music by:

- Listening to and talking about music
- Singing songs
- **Playing musical instruments**
- Making up their own songs and rhythms
- Exploring how sounds can be made and changed

Develop their imagination by:

- Being creative: a cardboard box to you can easily become a palace or a cave to a child
- Using stories in their play when using small world toys
- Reading and retelling stories
- Pretending to be someone or something else
